Minutes of the Annual Financial Meeting February 3, 2019

Prior to the opening of the scheduled meeting, Council President, Lisa Kollmorgen introduced the Northwestern Safety Training video: "Run, Hide, Fight ". She reminded everyone that in the event of an emergency, awareness is the best preparedness. A brief discussion followed to remind the congregation to be aware of all exits at St. James.

Approval of June 3, 2018 Minutes-Approved

Final 2018 Review – Jon Paul, Treasurer presenting. 2018 ended with St. James having a balanced budget once again. First year without a mortgage! Pledged giving came in at about 98%, with greater than budgeted non-pledged giving allowing for additional benevolence spending, including:

- \$70K was donated to start a Benevolence Endowment Fund to provide for matching grants.
- The first grant, \$8K, was given to match the first \$8K given by other families for Disaster Relief.
- \$15K went to Waukegan to College Fund and this ministry was added to our budgeted benevolence giving in 2019.
- \$6K went to COOL transitional housing.
- \$5K was donated to Sagrado Corazón.
- \$3.4K went to a variety of other ministries, including Super Bowl of Caring, Samaritan Counseling and Refugee One.

In addition, 15% of member giving to the General Fund was distributed to the ELCA, ELCA designated benevolences and a host of other ministries.

Presentation of the 2019 General Fund Budget –

With generous support in 2018, we anticipate a balanced budget, even after allocating \$35.5K to be paid in 2019, for various endeavors. (\$29K to be determined by the Council). Significant factors are as follows:

- Benevolence giving is increased slightly in 2019, as Waukegan to College Fund was added to the benevolence budget.

- Personnel costs came in just under budget in 2018 with the Bell Choir Director position now being handled by the Music Director.
- Property expenses came in close to budget with utilities higher in 2018, but snow removal and maintenance under.
- Technology costs increased, along with miscellaneous costs including gifts to retiring members.
- Insurance costs were under budget with better rates on property insurance.
- Reduced spending in 2018 on guest musicians and organists, however, budget remains the same for 2019.
- Christian Education spending can vary depending upon member participants and any offsetting fundraisers or fees. Budget increased in anticipation of more youth participation.
- Investments declined during Q4 of 2018, but still up over the past 3 years.
- The Land Fund is down to \$42K due to annual distributions to Major Maintenance and Benevolence.
- We had a surplus in the overall operating funds in 2018.
- Due to generous, designated gifts totaling \$70K, a Benevolence Endowment Fund was created to match gifts for various benevolence purposes.

2019 Mission: Experiencing Homelessness

Alane Wanda presented the 2019 St. James Mission: Experiencing Homelessness. This campaign will be kicked off during Lent with a goal of \$12K (before matching funds) for PADS, COOL and Habitat for Humanity.

All agreed we are blessed to be in a solid financial position.

Report of the President

I have heard it said that abundance is an attitude or a mindset. What does the word bring up for you? In the world around us we hear about abundance in terms of material goods and wealth, yet we hear in the Bible that Jesus came to earth that we might have life and have it abundantly (John 10:10). Jesus was referring to life beyond our earthly definitions. Abundance is the word that comes to mind as I think of this past year as President of the church council.

It started out with several important staff positions that needed to be filled. Between June and December of 2018 the following positions were filled: Director of Music, Hand bell Choir Director, Brass Ensemble Director, Nursery Supervisor, and Office Administrators (2). With some big shoes to fill, we were blessed to find exceptional people to serve our congregation in these roles. We have an abundance of talent in our musicians and staff members.

We presented two Safety Sundays that the council felt were part of being a responsible organization that is mindful of safety inside the building. The first, last June, was on fire safety—knowing the exits, location of fire extinguishers and how to use the AED (Automated External Defibrillator). The second in February focused on what to do if someone with a firearm comes in to do harm—Run, Hide, Fight. The news each day tells of the abundance of hate, hurt, and disconnection in our world. We, as the church, serve to love our neighbor, heal spiritual wounds, and to be a source of inclusion and connection in the world.

The council has continued to write “Shepherd Letters” and send emails to member families. We feel it is so important to make connections within the church family. It holds us together, supports our mission, and encourages each of you to reach out to the next member, new members, and

visitors. It invites each of you to get involved in any activity or form of service you might find meaningful. There are an abundance of opportunities to serve here at St. James.

As president, I would like to take credit for the largest general fund surplus ever! But, as is true for most presidents, the credit belongs elsewhere. It belongs with you who give. Council has been thoughtfully deliberating how to allocate this abundance. We have already designated some funds for in-house needs like staff bonuses and equipment, as well as for a variety of benevolence needs. We invite you to contact your council shepherd if you have additional ideas or suggestions.

I am genuinely awed by the generosity of our members. We more than doubled our fund raising goal for “Experiencing Homelessness” and tripled our giving through not one, but three matching gift donations! Out of the abundance of blessings from God we share with those in need. We share financially, we share our time, experience, wisdom, talents, and love. That is what the Gospel says is abundant living!

It has been an honor and a blessing serving as your council president. St. James is both blessed and a blessing. Special thanks to Pastor Holmer for his guidance and tutelage, and to the council for their time and talents. (They also tolerated my occasional wreckage of Robert’s Rules of Order.) Looking forward, the council will continue to discuss ways to strengthen our church family and welcome new members. I plan to continue to connect with members old and new, inviting each of you to find your place to serve.

Report of Pastor Holmer

Dear Friends in Christ,

We are blessed to be in a good place as a congregation. At present there is a warm feeling of community combined with a clear sense of mission. A spirit of peace and joy is manifest as we gather together for worship. It is a great and happy privilege to lead this community of believers in worship, week by week. It is encouraging to witness the variety of ways our members engage in service to others over the course of the year. It is rewarding to work with the many talented leaders who serve on our church council and committees. It is gratifying to have new members describe the welcoming hospitality they have experienced at St. James. It is inspiring to see persons grow through their participation in learning: at Sunday School, First Communion Class, Confirmation, Adult Class, Faith Forum, Bible Study, Newcomers and Bible in 90 Days.

Wonderful things happen each week, both within our walls and in the wider community where people go to serve. When we experience positive outcomes on a consistent basis, it could be possible to take them for granted. I hope I never do. God's good work is faithfully carried on by all of you. Along with all the good things that happen with regularity, I note a few highlights from the past year.

- * We have added some great new leaders to our staff. When the Hasketts retired, I was unsure how we would be able to replace them. God blessed us with the rich gifts of Rae-Myra Hilliard who is doing tremendous work with our Adult Choir and Handbells. I was very concerned about the future of the St. James Brass when Daniel Heiman had to retire. He has been the heart and soul of that ensemble for 26 years. Yet Ryan Ringnalda came to us at the right moment, and the brass group is flourishing. Nursery Supervisor is an important position – not easy to fill. Vanessa Moreno has proved to be a wonderful asset. (And her brother, Andrew, occasionally plays drums for Damascus Road).
Shelly Holmstrom has grown into her role as Engagement Coordinator, helping to launch

new ministries and involving members in active participation. Our administrative tandem of Carol Bennett and Kristin Haverkamp has a creative and productive partnership in managing the church office. Likewise, Melinda Voelcker and Greg MacAyeal are doing an excellent job sharing leadership for Damascus Road.

Stalwart leadership is also provided by our staff members with longer tenure. Chris Meyer manages our business affairs with skill and grace. Debbie MacAyeal keeps finding creative ways to teach and guide our Sunday School. Wendy Wieggers makes beautiful music with our Children's Choir. Doug Dusthimer has great rapport with our youth.

- * It is always a joy to welcome new members to our congregation. This year we have received two groups of newcomers. Their gifts and energy enrich the life we share.
- * Our members continue to grow in generosity! For the first time in memory, we ended the fiscal year with a surplus balance of \$35,000. We are still considering how best to use these funds. And the response to our special offering to support ministries with those experiencing homelessness has been nothing short of phenomenal. Our original goal was \$12,000, which we hoped to match with funds given for benevolence by a member. Then another member expressed a desire to match the gift – and then yet another. The congregation ended up doubling the original goal by giving \$24,000! Matched with the three gifts, the total comes to \$60,000. Thanks be to God!
- * In recent years we made major renovations to our building and grounds. This past year we have made major improvements in our communications. Our electronic newsletter, Connections, brings news and inspiration on a weekly basis in a creative and interactive format. After a long wait, the flat screen in our narthex is now a lively and informative resource. I enjoy sending my weekly Reflections on the scripture readings for Sunday.

- * We have many great worship services over the course of the church year. Once every three years we host the Community Thanksgiving Service. The worship on Thanksgiving was a great joy.
- * It was most enjoyable to lead a group from St. James on a visit to the Holy Land last November. For some it was a second trip, for others it was their first time. For all of us it was a memorable and moving experience to spend time in that unique place.
- * I find great value in the annual retreats in which I share. The Council retreat helps to strengthen relationship among our elected leaders and time to consider mission plans and priorities. The Men's Retreat serves to inspire and engage all who attend. It would be good for us to find ways to involve more of our members in such retreat experiences.

I am thankful for the faithful service of the council members who are completing their terms. Lisa Kollmorgen, Jenn Bodine, Kim Kazarian and Joe Voelcker have been dedicated leaders. Lisa served as council president this year and her steady hand has been a blessing. Jon Paul has been a tremendous asset to our congregation for many years, sharing his financial acumen. Jon has agreed to serve one more year. As his term as treasurer draws to a close, I extend a special word of gratitude for his faithfulness through both good times and challenging times. Finally I thank all of you who make St. James such a great place to serve and belong by your generous spirit and good hearts.

- We are always looking for new committee members and new ideas to reenergize our activities. We are working with Engagement Coordinator Shelly Holmstrom to help us in these areas.

Planting the seed of Service is our overarching goal. This past year we have focused on synergies with other St. James ministries – Youth, Sunday School, WOSJ, OWLS, Sewing Group, Evangelism, and Fellowship to name a few – to work together on projects and build relationships.

Beginning in 2018, the committee took over the Give 5/4 Need Program with the intent to plant the seed of Service in our children in 5-8th grades. This dovetails nicely with our Confirmation Outreach, which has our 7th and 8th graders volunteering at PADS in the Fall and Spring.

Starting with Give 5 in 5th and 6th grade begins their Service journey and makes for a natural progression to Service during their Confirmation years. We worked with many of our outreach partners doing volunteer work in the community and, as a new twist, forging new relationships with St. James adults in the OWLS and the Sewing Group. We also expanded the program to two weeks, in order to accommodate busy summer schedules.

Additionally, we have members who faithfully attend PADS, volunteer at North Chicago Schools, and tutor at Waukegan to College. St. James sponsors COOL events including the WALK/RUN and FOODSTOCK

The 2018 theme of EDUCATION paved the way for many opportunities to educate ourselves. We chose Waukegan to College to receive our Lenten extraordinary giving campaign. We were overjoyed to exceed our \$10K goal and present to them a total of \$13,600!

The 2019 theme of SERVING THE HOMELESS has made for a particularly meaningful focus. Supporting three agencies we are very committed to every year and deepening our understanding of their outreach resulted in “blowing the roof off” our goal of \$12K. We thank with deep gratitude three generous St. James members who offered matching funds. We will be presenting PADS, COOL, and Habitat for Humanity with checks totaling \$60K at a special presentation on June 2. WE are blessed to be a blessing!

We are also blessed that our membership approved a budget in January that will continue to support our extensive outreach. It is a joy to give and serve as a congregation family!

Thank you to all the Committee members for their participation and support of our outreach and to Sarah Lewis for her service on the COOL Board of Directors.

We are looking for a few more individuals to join the Christian Education Committee. We would appreciate someone with Sunday School age children for representation. Our group selects and implements the St. James Christian educational curriculum for our adults and children.

Youth Education

This year’s milestones included the following achievements:

- Three third grade children were presented with Bibles on September 23, 2018.
- Seven ninth graders were confirmed on September 30, 2018.
- This year our Confirmation students participated in serving the PADS meal once in the fall and once in the spring. This was in lieu of participating in the CROPwalk.
- Six fourth graders received First Communion on either March 3 or March 17, 2019 following their completed classes.

This year’s Youth Programs included the following:

- Vacation Bible School took place July 8, 15, and 22, 2018 following the 9:30 summer service from 10:30-12:00. The theme was Babylon. An average of 10 children attended per Sunday. We had only two to three youth leaders with two to three parents helping.
- On Rally Day, we opted to provide games for the children rather than a performer.
- We had 13 confirmation students (eight 8th graders and five 7th graders) this church year—8 boys and 5 girls.
- We started a High School Education class that takes place approximately once a month, which is led by Doug Dusthimer and Doug

Gerber. While our high school youth may always join our Adult Education class upon graduating from our Sunday School program, for those youth who wish to participate with students their own age, this program will allow them to do so.

- Wendy Wieggers led our children’s Christmas Pageant on December 9, 2018 at the 10:45am service.
- Campfirmation will take place June 23-28, 2019.
- The Mission Trip will occur July 13-20, 2019.
- In 2018, our Give 5/4Need program was coordinated by Social Ministry and has moved to that report.
- This year’s Christmas Pageant will be December 15, 2019.

Adult Education

Our Adult Education program takes place in the Common Room between the early and late services from fall through spring. This year our adult education viewed/studied the following:

- *The Creed* by First Things
- The Weekly Readings
- Our Summer Adult Education offering in connection with Vacation Bible > School was led by Susan Jarzembki and Pastor Holmer. The three sessions were very well attended.

Sunday School

This year the rotation curriculum studied Who is Jesus.

- 45 students are enrolled in the Sunday School program.
- 14 teachers, including 2 high school students, gave of their time to educate our children of St. James.
- Preschoolers are using the Holy Moly Curriculum. This curriculum has a two year plan so that content is new for both 3 and 4 year old’s each year.

Beginning in September 2018, our 7th and 8th graders began using the Collaborate by Spark House curriculum.

Report of the Worship and Music Committee

“For Lutherans, worship stands at the center of our life of faith. Through God’s word, water, bread and prayer we are nurtured in faith and sent out into the world.

Connected with and central to everything we do, worship unites us in celebration, engages us in thoughtful dialogue and helps us grow in faith. It grounds us in our Christian and Lutheran roots, while demonstrating practical relevance for today’s world.

...Central to our worship life is the presence of God through word and sacrament. The word proclaimed and the sacraments — both Holy Baptism and Holy Communion — are called the means of grace. We believe that Jesus Christ is present in these means through the power of the Holy Spirit. Sometimes we describe worship as a ‘gathering around the means of grace.’” (From the ELCA website Worship page)

We are blessed by the leadership of Pastor Holmer, who will celebrate the 40th anniversary of his ordination June 10, 2019. This milestone will be celebrated by the congregation on June 9, which is the Day of Pentecost this year.

This was a year of change in our music staff. We said farewell and Godspeed to Tim and Gretchen Haskett (Music Director and Bell Choir Director). Daniel Heiman retired as Brass Ensemble director. We welcomed two new music leaders to our staff. Rae-Myra Hilliard fills the role of Music Director (which includes directing the adult choir) and Bell Choir Director. Ryan Ringnalda is the Brass Ensemble director. Melinda Voelcker and Greg MacAyeal share the Damascus Road Coordinator job, Wendy Wieggers continues as Children’s Music Director, and Wendy Unrath serves as our organist.

A few words from Rae-Myra Hilliard:

I was overwhelmed with the celebration of Jesus' resurrection because of the high level of musicianship that was presented. I have had many church "jobs" but since 2007, my duties have been in the director position. I have to say that at my previous church, Zion Evangelical Lutheran, the musical standard was very high, and I was blessed to have worked with the folk there for 11 years.

St. James has the same high standard of musicianship BUT the big difference is the number of

ensembles that live within the church. Because of these ensembles, St., James can literally touch everyone with its music program. In reading and studying the Word, music has a leading role in religious celebration.

The collaboration between the brass and adult choir at the 8:30am service maintained the tone set by brass and organ from the start of service. But then came the 10:45 service and, yes, I am showing a bit of favoritism here. The "Don't Cry" anthem is very dear to my heart because of how it helped me to see and grow beyond the "sadness" of Good Friday. I think the presentation brought forth in the service was the best we had performed and the 10:15 rehearsal was pretty powerful!

I am blessed to have this opportunity to work with all of you fabulous musicians at St. James.

A few words from Ryan Ringnalda:

First of all, I am very fortunate to work with such a devoted and talented group. Joining with the other musical ensembles, under the leadership of Rae-Myra to support the ministry of St. James, is truly a blessing. We look forward to each and every opportunity to join together, share these gifts, our talents, and our reverence with our congregation.

A few words from Wendy Wieggers:

The Children’s choir is an exceptionally talented group of young singers from Kindergarten through 8th grade. Not only do we sing at one service almost every month, but provide most of the singers, narrators, and characters for the Christmas Pageant as well as the synopsis of the Sunday School year on Mother’s Day. We will dearly miss our graduating 8th graders and hope they will join their talents in one of the other musical groups as young adults. Report of the Endowment Fund Board

Members: Jim Davoux, Mike Bennett, Rob Davis, Jerry Herb, Hans Bodine, Pastor Richard Holmer (ex officio)

The Endowment fund began 2018 with a balance of \$245,830 and ended 2018 with a balance of \$278,194. In early 2018 the church received an anonymous donation in the amount of \$50,000. The stated intent of the gift is to be used as a "matching gift" fund over the coming years. Again, near the end of 2018, an additional gift of \$20,000 was received. As Saint James holds extra benevolence campaigns for a selected cause (Disaster Relief, Focus on the Homeless, etc.) this fund can be used to incentivize the campaign. The fund will not be designated as a permanent endowment, but rather will be exhausted over a period of 4-5 years. The Endowment board has co-invested these funds and will work with the church council to set matching gift amounts as campaigns are initiated. During 2018 a disbursement of \$8,000 was made from this benevolence fund for Disaster Relief. In 2019, a disbursement of \$24,000 was made from this benevolence fund for the focus on the Homeless campaign.

The Land Fund began 2018 with a balance of \$1,081,783 and ended 2018 with a balance of \$985,589. During the first half of 2018 the markets performed well, and the board advised the church council that the Land Fund should take a full 4% disbursement. A 4% disbursement of \$42,234 was made from the Land Fund in June of 2018. Those funds were made available to the church council for major maintenance and benevolence. The investment performance of the Land Fund continues to do well in the spring of 2019. As of the end of April, 2019, the balance of the endowment fund is \$1,091,250. This puts us on track to recommend a 4% disbursement again in 2019.

The congregation is always welcome and encouraged to submit ideas to the board for potential disbursements from the Endowment Fund. Contact any member of the board to discuss your thoughts.
