Minutes of the Annual Financial Meeting January 26, 2020

Opening Prayer: Pastor Holmer Adoption of Agenda: Approved

Financial Report: Jon Paul

- Gives 2019 summary: balanced budget, member giving at 106%; \$35,000 set aside for future benevolence; benevolence climbs to \$217,000; investment of land sale \$37,000;
- 16% appreciation in the markets; Major Maintenance Fund at \$122,000
- General Fund Receipts: pledged giving \$582,000; non-pledged giving \$35,000; other member giving \$15,000; pledge campaign up \$17,000
- General Fund Expenses: spending up 2%; Benevolence 15% of spending at \$92,000; Personnel 59% of spending to \$376,000; Property 10% of spending at \$62,000; Future Spending at \$35,000
- Benevolence: General Fund \$92,000; Special Benevolence doubled; \$18,000 from other fundraisers; \$14,000 from General Fund reserves for ELCA Disaster and Lutheran World Federation Ways to become involved: attend a worship service,

Report of the President

Whenever I am given the opportunity to read scripture during a church service, I get goosebumps. Roughly halfway through the reading, I feel the Holy Spirit present in me and in my fellow church members. When I end the reading with "The word of the Lord," I feel a connection with the Lord and with you. In the past two months, the way in which we meet has drastically changed. The altering of how we "Passed the Peace" when concerns arose about the flu in January morphed into a hiatus from live worship services in March due to Covid-19. But we adapted. Undaunted, we began streaming worship services every Sunday. Church members volunteered their time to produce, to film, to read, to sing, and to perform. Connections were not lost. When my family and I participate in the Sunday online service, I still feel the Holy Spirit present, and I still feel connected to all of you.

Over the course of the last year, we have stayed true to our mission: follow Christ, make disciples, and live the gospel.

Through a series of Lenten Wednesdays, we got to know our fellow brothers and sisters from Sagrado Corazón. We heard about their goals and dreams as we shared a meal together. With your generosity through this year's campaign and a matching fund, we were able to raise \$42,000 for their congregation. Your donations have recently been extremely beneficial as families from their congregation have met financial hardships due to Covid-19. Once we are able to schedule events with them, we will do so.

We continue to support COOL, PADS, Waukegan to College, and Habitat both with our time and with our donations. I thank those who have helped build homes, helped prepare meals, and helped distribute food for those in need. Your generosity over the past two years has allowed us to use the surplus money to bolster their efforts to provide aid for those they serve.

In the beginning of April we applied for and were granted a Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loan of \$54,000. This loan converts into a grant after the loan requirements are met concerning payroll.

At our most recent meeting, Council agreed that even after we are able to meet in person, we will continue to offer an on-line version of our worship service. We have been truly blessed to be able to connect each Sunday, and congregational comments echo the same sentiments. I personally thank Susan Holmer, Kristin Haverkampf, and Dean Haverkampf for their time and efforts in getting our digital worship service from non-existent to the wonderful production you see each Sunday.

Also know that Council has created a subcommittee that will discuss our worship service and Covid-19's impact upon it. The committee will examine our service and implement best practices with our congregation's safety as top priority.

As president, I have been blessed by God with a Council and a congregation that supports and loves one another. I thank Pastor Holmer for his guidance and wisdom this past year and Council's time and talents in guiding the church (also their patience while I attempt to load Zoom meetings). I also thank Jon Paul for his service as treasurer these past years. His efforts and financial advice have truly been a blessing. And I thank you, the congregation. Your generosity these past two years has allowed us to continue to minister to those in need, a need greater than ever. I will continue to serve the church as a Sunday school teacher and as a member of the Covid-19 subcommittee.

Report of Pastor Holmer

Each year the first step in preparing my annual report is to get out my calendar and review what transpired over the past 12 months. This time around that process brought to mind things we have already missed and events we will miss in the near future. The first Sunday we were not able to gather was the date the Lake Forest High School Choir was scheduled to sing. Then we had a "virtual" Holy Week. Events like the Progressive Dinner and the Women's Retreat had to be cancelled as were Men's Breakfasts.

In the coming weeks we have to forgo traditional events like the Father's Day Pancake Breakfast, Campfirmation and FOODSTOCK (which will be held "virtually" this year). Of course what we miss most of all is gathering for weekly worship in our beautiful sanctuary with all the people we know and love. There is nothing to be gained by whining about what we cannot do at present, but there is a legitimate place for lamenting the absence of what we treasure. Our life as a congregation is centered on gathering around Word and Sacrament as people of God. Online worship is worthwhile, but it cannot match the vitality of being present together in God's house. We can console one another with the assurance that our exile is temporary.

The past year included many memorable highlights. We elected a new bishop for our synod, Bishop Yehiel Curry. I hope for a visit from him when we are back in church. Give 5/4 Need had two great sessions last summer. Kickoff Sunday had some new activities and new energy. Eight students were confirmed. The Church Council had a constructive retreat. All the events of Advent and Christmas were splendid. Men of St. James had another successful retreat. Four students received their first communion. We initiated a deeper relationship with the congregation of Sagrado Corazón.

Our stewardship theme from last fall now seems prescient. Hope Perseveres is a most appropriate watchword for us as we make our

way through this pandemic. Our hope in God can sustain us through challenges and uncertainty. And we can offer hope to others by our example, our service and our generosity.

So far we have not lost any members to COVID-19. However, over the last year three saints of our congregation have gone home to God. Jim Benton, Gladys Babich and Lyle Neagle were all longtime members and faithful servants. May they rest in God's grace and peace.

The Great Change came in the middle of March. Since that time, we have had to learn new skills and adjust to a new normal. Zoom meetings, Zoom classes, worship on YouTube are now the order of the day. I am grateful for the technology and the skills of our staff that make these changes workable. We are all adapting as we go and finding new ways to do ministry. I am grateful for everyone's cooperation.

As to what lies ahead, it is hard to say for sure. Much is still not known about the Corona Virus, how it affects us and how long it will remain a threat. We have formed a team to consider conceptions for ways to gather together for worship – and to do so safely. It is not possible to predict how and when that may happen. Be assured we will keep you informed.

Though there is much we do not know, this we do know: we are blessed to be a blessing. St. James is a heathy congregation, and we are in a position to bless and support others. In a marvelous way, God has prepared us to be useful during this pandemic. A number of events in the past few years have combined to put us in a strong position:

- * Our mortgage is paid—we have no debt.
- * The fiscal year of 2018 and 2019 ended with a total surplus well over \$50,000, thanks to your generous giving.
- * We have built our Contingency Fund up to \$30,000.
- * We received a PPP loan which we are using to cover payroll costs as well as utilities. As long as

we use it as required, we are anticipating that the loan will be forgiven.

Our financial resources enable us to offer significant support to our mission partners. We have already made gifts to COOL Ministries, PADS, Habitat for Humanity Lake County, Waukegan to College and the Synod COVID Relief Fund for congregations in financial stress. In addition, once again you surpassed the matching mission challenge for Sagrado Corazón, providing a total of over \$42,000 to strengthen their ministry. Thanks be to God! God is truly at work through the people of St. James. In these dark days we can shine a way of hope and love.

I am deeply grateful to all our dedicated staff members as we pivot to address new realities. I am thankful for the leadership of our church council, especially those who are completing their terms: Rob Davis, Madeleine Jorgensen, Secretary Melodi Peters and President Doug Gerber. Special thanks are in order to Jon Paul who is retiring as our Treasurer after nearly two decades of faithful service over the years.

June 10th will be the 41st anniversary of my ordination. These present challenges have renewed my sense of calling as a pastor. I feel the Holy Spirit moving in our congregation and in my ministry. The other day I was moved to enter the sanctuary and to sing a hymn of praise: "Praise to The Lord the Almighty". It was not like singing when the church is full – but that day will surely come. I know that God is with us, God's hand is leading us, God's love is supporting us. By grace, we will persevere.

Report of the Social Ministry Outreach Committee

The purpose of the committee is to promote and support activities of various agencies and programs serving the needs of the local community and the ELCA. We encourage members to get involved and thank those who have volunteered in a variety of ways, including support of our many "asks" on the kiosk each month! This is just one of many ways you make a difference in the daily lives of those struggling in our own community.

Planting the seed of Service is our overarching goal. This past year we have continued to focus on synergies with other St. James ministries — Youth, Christian Ed, WOSJ, OWLs, Sewing Group, Evangelism, and Fellowship to name a few — to work together on projects and build relationships.

Beginning in 2018, the committee took over the Give 5/4 Need Program with the intent to plant the seed of Service in our children in 5-8th grades. This dovetails nicely with our Confirmation Outreach, which has our 7th and 8th graders volunteering at PADS in the Fall and Spring. Starting with Give 5 in 5th and 6th grade begins their Service journey and makes for a natural progression to Service during their Confirmation years.

We are excited to report that beginning in 2020, we will be working synergistically with Christian Ed and Youth on Give 5. This allows for the strengths of all committees to be showcased and utilized. We are pleased that we are going to be able to pivot the program in the face of the new reality of coronavirus. We plan for virtual connection and a menu of activities that can be done from home. The committees agree that this flexibility will allow for families to participate together, which is encouraged. We expect even more registrations this year for this dynamic program!

Additionally, we have members who faithfully attend PADS, volunteer at North Chicago Schools, and tutor at Waukegan to College. St. James sponsors FOODSTOCK, which is a COOL fundraiser.

Our 2020 congregation focus is Sagrado Corazón in Waukegan, IL. We anticipate many opportunities to partner with them in ministry and service. The Lenten goal of \$10,000 was exceeded, and with matching funds, St. James collected over \$42,000. An example of partnering is introducing their leadership to agencies in Waukegan that can assist any of their members during this "new normal", especially COOL Food Pantry. Additionally, we have invited their youth to participate in Give 5! God is Good!

We continue to strengthen our relationship with our primary partners – NCCP, COOL, PADS, and Habitat for Humanity.

We are also blessed that our membership approved a budget in January that will continue to support our extensive outreach. It is a joy to give and serve as a congregation family!

Thank you to all the Committee members for their participation and support of our outreach and to Mark Wanda for volunteering to be our representative on the COOL Board of Directors.

Report of the Christian Education Committee

We are looking for a few more individuals to join the Christian Education Committee. We would appreciate a member with Sunday School age children for representation. Our group selects and implements the St. James Christian educational curriculum for our adults and children.

Sunday School

- We have 24 families with children enrolled in our Sunday School program.
- This year the rotation curriculum was "the Kingdom Stories."
- Preschoolers used the Sparkhouse Colaborate curriculum.
- Seventh and eighth graders used the "Created in Christ" by Concordia curriculum.
- During our stay-at-home, Debbie MacAyeal provided an activity for children each week. It was part of the Connections email.

Youth Education

This year's milestones included the following achievements:

- Six third grade children were presented with their Holy Bibles on September 15 and 22, 2019.
- Eight ninth graders were confirmed on September 22, 2019.
- Our Confirmation students participated in serving a PADS meal once in the fall and once in the spring.
- Four fourth graders received First Communion on February 23, 2020 following their completed classes.

This year's Youth Programs included the following:

- On Kick-Off Sunday, Debbie MacAyeal provided her horses for the pony rides and the committee members helped coordinate those who wanted to participate.
- We had 7 confirmation students (five 8th graders

and two 7th graders) this church year.

- The High School Education class led by Doug Dusthimer and Doug Gerber continues to take place once each month. While our high school youth may always join our Adult Education class upon graduating from our Sunday School program, for those youth who wish to participate with students their own age, this program allows them to do so.
- Wendy Wiegers led our children's Christmas Pageant on December 15, 2019 at the 10:45am service.
- Due to COVID-19, Campfirmation will not take place this year.
- June 15-19, 2020—Our Christian Education committee will be joining the Social Ministry committee for a virtual GIVE5/4NEED program. Linda Berner, Kathy Lowell and Debbie MacAyeal are helping create the educational curriculum portion of the program.
- June 22-26, 2020 Debbie MacAyeal will provide a weeklong virtual VBS program this year. It will be an extension of what she has been providing during our Stay-at-Home Order for our Sunday School children.

Adult Education

Our Adult Education program takes place in the Common Room between the early and late services from fall through spring. This year our adult education viewed/studied the following:

Report of the Worship and Music Committee

O be joyful! A great idea from Pastor Holmer's May 24th sermon, but it's not so easy right now.

The last time we worshiped together in our sanctuary was on March 8, 2020. The pastor, musicians, and producers (recording and editing) have been scrambling ever since to put together a worship service that is amenable to in home worship and praise of our Lord. Many thanks to the music staff for providing music and recruiting submissions for our online format of worship. Thanks to Daniel Heiman for the St. James Brass Ensemble recordings from some years back that we were able to use. And thanks to the readers for their recordings.

We are relying on mass emails to keep our congregation informed of worship and other news. You should be receiving an email with a link to the worship service each Sunday morning. Also included in that email is a link to a printable bulletin and, for the past few weeks, printable children's bulletins. If you have not seen the services online, search YouTube for st james lutheran church lake forest il

Before our immersion in internet productions, though, we were busy upgrading the sound system for the spoken word and hearing assistance and Damascus Road. We were busy with rehearsals and plans for Holy Week while respecting the season of Lent. Before that, we walked through the season of Advent, practicing hopeful waiting.

Hopeful waiting and persevering is what we continue to do. Is this a taste of what it was like for the earliest Christians, who had no idea how long their wait would be? How long, they must have wondered, will we wait for Christ to return. They were patient and hopeful. We must be like them.

In the course, The Bible in 90 Days, there is a session where the readings involve hardship and awful struggles and woes borne by God's people. The lecturer has this advice: Don't ask why

something bad happened. Rather, ask what for? In other words, asking why is looking back, but asking what for is looking ahead to how we can go forward despite what has happened in a way that honors God, who is with us through hardship.

Just as each of us is both saint and sinner, there have been some positive things among the negatives of this pandemic time. We have worshiped God without fail every week, though not in person. During Lent we added online Vespers. The passion reading tradition continued. The organ played. The brass played. There was singing. All of this will continue, with the added evangelical element that our worship services are seen by a wider audience and have been shared. Many of us have learned new skills in recording and transmitting files electronically. We have seen enthusiastic participation in this new style of worship by readers, musicians, and behind the scenes production. There is a feeling of cooperation and community in this process.

For the foreseeable future, worship will be an online experience. How we come back into our building has not yet been determined. As we study the recommendations for best practices, it is most likely that our return to worship as an inperson congregation will take place in stages, and much more slowly than we would like.

With our building off limits, we are being challenged to be the church, the body of Christ, in this world. God is still calling us to follow Christ, make disciples, and live the Gospel. Thanks be to God.

Report of the Endowment Fund Board

The Endowment fund began 2019 with a balance of \$278,194 and ended 2019 with a balance of \$333,832. This includes the "matching gift" funds that are currently co-invested with the other endowment funds. In mid-2019, a disbursement of \$24,000 was made from this matching gift fund for the focus on the Homeless campaign. Late in 2019, an additional disbursement of \$6,400 was made to begin the 2020 campaign supporting Sagrado Corazón. In mid-May of 2020, an additional disbursement of \$13,600 was made to bring the full total to \$20,000 in matching funds for the Sagrado Corazón campaign.

The Land Fund began 2019 with a balance of \$985,589 and ended 2019 with a balance of \$1,109,900. During the first half of 2019 the markets performed well, and a 4% disbursement

of \$43,286 was made from the Land Fund in June of 2019. Those funds were made available to the church council for major maintenance and benevolence. The investment performance of the Land Fund did well in the spring of 2019, but then lost ground as the COVID-19 pandemic started. The Land Fund has fared better than the broader markets due to the conservative nature of the investments. The committee will continue to monitor the markets during these uncertain times with the assistance of Wintrust as our investment advisors.

The congregation is always welcome and encouraged to submit ideas to the board for potential disbursements from the Endowment Fund. Contact any member of the board to discuss your thoughts.

Report of the Property Committee

- —Two window panes were replaced in July, 2019. One in Pastor Holmer's office and one in narthex.
- —New refrigerator in Sacristy (old one inoperative).
- —Historical roof leaking issues in the common room and back hallway have been fixed—no additional cost to St. James. An overall roof assessment will be done in 2020.
- —Two significant access points for rodents and wasps were found and sealed.

Major Maintenance:

- —New sound system in the Sanctuary.
- -Main office-All ceiling tiles were replaced.
- —Other three offices—New drywall ceiling installed as well as new light fixtures.
- —Replacement of furnace board for rooftop HVAC .
- Replacement of #2 and #3 stage draft inducers for rooftop HVAC
- —Extensive tree trimming was done on our property in July, 2019 and then dormant pruning in December, 2019.

Pete Clemens report on Sanctuary lighting project:

In the sanctuary are 23 floodlight fixtures that use high energy 90 & 500 watt incandescent bulbs. Since we've transitioned to LED lighting throughout the church over the past several years, we've been waiting for the development of LED floodlights. Recently 17 LED floodlights, 28 and 36 watt, became available. It was decided to replace 8 burned out incandescent bulbs, plus install 5 additional fixtures we had in the storeroom with LEDs. With a total energy savings of 6,000 watts/hour we can try the new LEDs for the next year, and when more incandescent bulbs burn out, they can be replaced with long lasting LEDs. You should see a sanctuary that's 40% brighter when we all return to regular services.

A special thanks to Pete Clemens for taking on the Sanctuary lighting project and for his continuous vigilance and work on our property. And special thanks to Werner Stein for his electrical expertise and willingness to make our electrical repairs. And lastly, special thanks to John Tanner for coordinating roof repairs (and handling clean up when it leaks!) and all the other behind the scenes jobs John undertakes.
